
Since you've already seen many places in Peloponnese and Zakynthos, time to "taste" central Greece too.

Delfoi

Delfoi was the site of the most important oracle in ancient Greece. The temple itself was built on a verdant hillside on the southern slope of Mt. Parnassus and was consecrated to a central figure in the Greek pantheon: Apollo, the god of light, the sun and prophecy.

When people of all social standing, both rulers and their subjects, faced problems in their lives and futures, they would travel to the mountain to consult the great oracle at Delfoi. On arrival they would be greeted by Pythia, a prophetess inspired by Apollo, who would respond to the questions asked. In this way people found vital and necessary answers to their problems and gained greater confidence in their own futures.





Rio

Here is the port that connects Peloponnese with the rest of Greece. A bridge is currently under construction, scheduled to be finished in 2004. At present there are ferry-boats serving the strait crossing but the bridge shall provide a permanent link reducing crossing time significantly. The bridge will facilitate communication between Greece

and Italy (and thus Western Europe) through the harbors of Patras and Igoumenitsa.

Kalogria Beach
